# Lost and Found: Long-lost Gravestone Returns Home to Lincoln after 30 Years at Boston College

Donald Hafner, professor of political science and director of the University Fellowships Program at Boston College noticed a gravestone in an office in the college, and decided to investigate. It turned out that the gravestone had been confiscated from a dormitory about 30 years ago. The inscription on the stone was for David Lapham, who died on November 11, 1753, just short of his 21st birthday. After some research on Findagrave, Hafner identified David Lapham, 1732-1753 from Rhode Island, and realized that the stone was originally from the Lapham -Wilcox lot, Lincoln Historical Cemetery #36, near Handy Pond in Lincoln.

Although 5 inscribed headstones were recorded in the lot in 1896, by 1995

only one was found in place, and the lot had been badly vandalized. From the information on Findagrave, David Lapham had been buried near a baby brother and a younger sister. The three died days apart; the brother on November 7, and the sister on November 13. The close proximity of the deaths made Hafner suspect an epidemic.

Melinda Stoops, associate vice president for student health and wellness and student affairs at Boston College learned about the stone from Hafner, and decided to reach out to the Conservation Lincoln Commission. Stephanie Santos of the Conservation Commission promptly contacted Ken Postle, cemetery coordinator for the BVHS, who instantly recognized the missing stone.

In the course of his work to find and restore historic cemeteries, he had actually created the page RI Historical Cemetery Lincoln #36, on the FindaGrave website. He believes that the pilfered stone was a replacement stone from the early 19<sup>th</sup> century for a earlier fieldstone marker. Postle went to the Handy lot to work on the cemetery on April 20, and to find a place to put the stone. He found more fieldstone burials (it seems likely up to 30 burials), and he also spoke to Mr. Al Pytka, who thinks he may have seen the inscribed stones in the 70s and 80s. ## **Desecration of Walnut Hill Cemetery**

The Walnut Hill cemetery at 200 Armistice Blvd in Pawtucket was severely damaged by the use of heavy machinery to clear undergrowth in a section of the cemetery, knocking down headstones and running over them. The cemetery is privately owned.

The City of Pawtucket and the State Archeologist's office have visited the cemetery and are working to demand that the cemetery be restored at the owner's expense. Please do not hesitate to express support for their efforts to the city of Pawtucket.

The state archeologist's office cited the laws established to protect cemeteries: "RIGL 23-18 which prohibits ground disturbance within 25 feet of a cemetery, and RIGL 11-20-2, which makes it a felony to "destroy, mutilate, deface..... a gravestone."
